It was the place where composer John Philip Sousa, whose mother was from Bavaria, was christened. Services in German are held twice each month.

Saint Mary Mother of God Church

The church features beautiful stained-glass windows inscribed with German family names, and also houses a shrine dedicated to Austrian Emperor Charles I.

German-American Heritage Museum

In addition to special exhibits, the museum houses a collection of artifacts highlighting the diversity, lives, and contributions of immigrants.

DC History Center

U.S Capitol and Washington Monument

www.visitthecapitol.gov | 202.226.8000 U.S. Capitol Grounds, Washington, DC 20004 Construction on the U.S. Capitol began in 1793, but work on this magnificent building has been an ongoing project. The majestic dome was designed by German architects August Schönborn, an immigrant from Thuringia, who worked under the fourth architect of the Capitol, fellow German American Thomas U. Walter. Other notable figures who helped build the Capitol were John Roebling (Brooklyn Bridge) and illustrator Urban Geier, who painted the ceiling fresco in the Lyndon B. Johnson Room. Further along the Mall is the Washington Monument with its aluminum lightning rod cap designed by William (Wilhelm) Frishmuth who had immigrated from Coburg.

German American Friendship Garden

1600 Constitution Ave NW, Washington, DC 20006

First established in 1983 by a Presidential Commission, the garden was formally dedicated in 1988 by President Ronald Reagan and German Chancellor Helmut Kohl as a symbol and testament to the ongoing friendship between the two countries. Several restorations and re-plantings followed with the last re-dedication occurring in 2022 in the presence of donors and dignitaries. The postevent reception was held at the German-American Heritage Museum.
